

Our Clinic provides Suboxone to patients struggling with opioid addiction. It helps alleviate withdrawal symptoms almost immediately and helps control cravings and prevent relapses.

Once symptoms are under control, we can treat the underlying causes of addiction. We work closely with Ridgecrest Regional Hospital mental health professionals to get you the support you need.

Our Suboxone Clinic is:

- Outpatient
- · Covered by most insurance
- Only for opioids Including heroin and prescription pain medications like Fentanyl, Morphine, Or Oxycodone.

Our Treatment Philosophy

Addiction is a disease.

We provide research-backed medication and treatments.

Anxiety, depression, PTSD, past trauma, and other issues can contribute to addiction.

We treat those as well.

You deserve compassion & respect.

We provide understanding, non-judgmental care that meets you where you are.

We believe in treating the whole person. So, we have a variety of mental health practitioners on staff to help manage addiction-related issues.

Many of our mental health services are available remotely.

You have questions. We have answers.

How often do I have to go in for Suboxone treatment?

For the first few weeks, you check in very frequently. Later on, you may check in monthly. The medication is a sublingual film that we'll prescribe, and you can take it at home.

How long will I have to take Suboxone?

Some people take Suboxone for years. Often, others can taper off the medication after 6-12 months.

What happens if I relapse during treatment?

We won't kick you out. We'll talk about it with you and get you the support you need to get back on track.

Will my treatment be covered by insurance?

Our clinic accepts most private employer insurance and public insurance like Medicare or Medicaid.
